

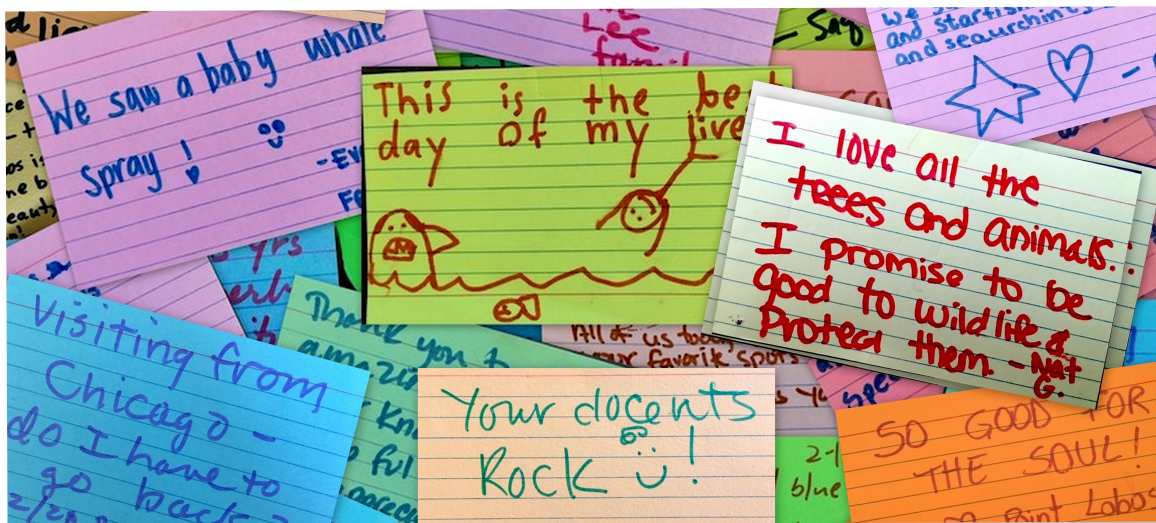

**Reg Henry** writes: I was fortunate to be contacted by a college professor, Stefanie Naumann, who lived in this area as a child and was invited to share a family reminiscence last month on “American Voices,” a show hosted by former Sen. Bill Bradley on Sirius XM radio. Her topic was Point Lobos. Her personal tale of multi-generational visits to the Reserve was a wonderful reminder of what is so special about the place we serve. She was born at CHOMP but moved away at age 5, only to return here every summer as she grew up.
